The show takes place in the Library which is one floor up from the main entrance. There is lift access if needed.

When you enter the Scottish Storytelling Centre (SSC), you will see a bookshop and café. To the left of the café space is where you will wait to go into the show.

A member of staff will make an announcement when the doors are open for the show and will scan your tickets.

They have removed the bookcases and put in chairs for you to sit on and put in some extra lights to light the performance space. Seating is unallocated so you may sit wherever you wish. This is the actor who will be telling Isabelle's story. Her name is Lucy. She will be standing in front of the seats in the performance space for the whole show.

More information about the performance

The performance will last 1 hour

There is no break in the middle

You may leave and come back at any time during the performance

The show has both comedic and serious moments and does mention some difficult issues.

- Short mention of sexual assault

None of these are acted out or graphic depictions, they are events described as part of the story.

What will happen during the show

The lights will stay the same from when you enter the room to when you leave.

The actor will come on stage and begin the show.

The show is a spoken-word performance that is spoken in Doric.

Lucy will stand on stage and deliver the show out front towards the audience throughout.

Lucy will say thank you and take a bow at the end.

That will be the end of the show.

If you are attending a BSL Interpreted performance, then the BSL interpreter will stand at the side of the stage and sign the show throughout
